

Butterfly Stretching

At the end of our play we get to meet a lot of beautiful butterflies. Try the relaxation exercise below to explore the butterfly life cycle with your little butterfly!

- **1.** Ask your child to make the shape of an egg with their bodies low to the ground.
- 2. Encourage your child to hatch slowly from the egg, stretching their bodies to become caterpillars. Invite your caterpillar to lay on their back and stretch their arms and legs out to relax.
- **3.** Next have them tense all of their muscles by pulling their arms and legs towards their tummy and hold that pose. Go back and forth between tense and relaxed.
- **4.** Create a cocoon by having your caterpillar stretch out, close their eyes and hug their bodies with their arms. Count out ten deep breaths together.
- **5.** The caterpillar is ready to break out of their cocoon! First one butterfly wing emerges and then the other. The newly hatched butterfly can try fluttering their wings slowly until they land next to you.



BONUS QUESTION: Ask your butterfly to tell you about their wings. What color or colors are they? What size are they?


Cat and Mouse Game

- To start this game, you and your child should be on opposite sides of the room. You are the cat and they are the mouse (or mice.)
- **2.** The mouse will win the game when they get to the other side of the room or are close to the cat.
- **3.** When the cat is looking, the mouse has to freeze.
- **4.** When the cat turns its back, the mouse can move with sneaky feet towards the cat.
- **5.** If the cat hears the mouse moving or turns around and sees the mouse moving, the mouse has to take 3 steps backwards.
- 6. Play until the mouse succeeds!



How Does a Flower Grow?

During the performance, we were able to see a beautiful flower grow and bloom. In the four squares below draw each of the steps that make up the life cycle of a plant. First, a seed is planted; second, the seed begins to sprout; third, the sprout blooms into a flower; fourth the flower drops little seeds into the ground. Those seeds will eventually grow into new flowers.

BONUS ACTIVITY:

Work with your child to draw each of the four steps in the plant life cycle onto index cards. Practice putting the steps in order and shaping your bodies like each of the different steps!

Flowers in the Great Outdoors

Collect some of the flowers that you see and paste them on a piece of paper. Press the flowers in a book, or work with your child to remember some of the flowers you saw and draw pictures of them.
